

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#### **Composer Note:**

Langston Hughes' poems combine hard truth and deep love, creating a space where reality and compassion become a single word. The people he writes about are heartbreakingly vulnerable and infinitely resilient, often in the same breath. When I came across his short, to-the-point poem, "Advice," it simply cried out for edgy rhythms, crunchy chords, and unbridled passion. I loved every minute of writing this song.

Langston Hughes poured the cadences of everyday life into his writing. Like his primary influences Paul Lawrence Dunbar, Carl Sandburg, and Walt Whitman, he was a keen observer of life, and particularly of Black American culture and experience. As a young writer, he was a prominent leader in the Harlem Renaissance, creating a lyrical, blues-inflected poetic form that would come to be called jazz poetry. The honesty, warmth and courage that Hughes brought to his many poems, plays and prose works led him to be much beloved by people of all races, ages and backgrounds.

The son of a German painter who specialized in insightful depictions of everyday people, **Winold Reiss** immigrated to the United States in 1913 to learn about and draw the people of America. He traveled to Montana in 1919 where he befriended the Blackfoot, who gave him the honorary name "Beaver Child" and inducted him into their tribe. In Mexico he spent a year drawing workers and revolutionaries. His portraits of African-Americans such as James Weldon Johnson, W.E.B. Du Bois, Countee Cullen,

Langston Hughes, and Zora Neale Hurston helped usher in and document the Harlem Renaissance. Over his prolific career Reiss drew portraits of people from all over North, Central and South America, including over 250 portraits of Indigenous Americans.

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
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
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
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
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












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
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
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
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
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
